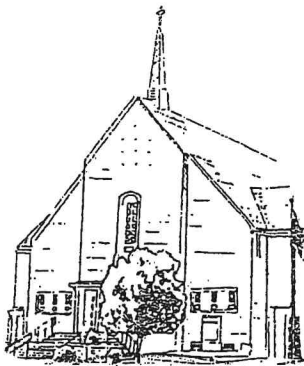

Introduction to the Devout Life

On January 24th we celebrated the memorial of St. Francis de Sales. He lived in France and died in the year 1622. He was both intelligent and holy. He earned a doctorate in law at the age of 24, and became a bishop at the age of 35. He was a great teacher and spiritual director. He is the patron saint of writers, journalists, and the Catholic press.

One of the things St. Francis de Sales is best known for is his famous book called: *Introduction to the Devout Life*.

For my article today, I'd like to include a snippet from this book in which St. Francis de Sales explains that each of us is called to the life of perfection in Christ.

When God the Creator made all things, he commanded the plants to bring forth fruit each according to its own kind; he has likewise commanded Christians, who are the living plants of his Church, to bring forth the fruits of devotion, each one in accord with his character, his station and his calling.

I say that devotion must be practiced in different ways by the nobleman and by the working man, by the servant and by the prince, by the widow, by the unmarried girl and by the married woman. But even this distinction is not sufficient; for the practice of devotion must be adapted to the strength, to the occupation and to the duties of each one in particular.

Tell me, please, my Philothea, whether it is proper for a bishop to want to lead a solitary life like a Carthusian; or for married people to be no more concerned than a Capuchin about increasing their income; or for a working man to spend his whole day in church like a religious; or on the other hand for a religious to be constantly exposed like a bishop to all the events and circumstances that bear on the needs of our neighbor. Is not this sort of devotion ridiculous, unorganized and intolerable? Yet this absurd error occurs very frequently, but in no way does true devotion, my Philothea, destroy anything at all. On the contrary, it perfects and fulfills all things. In fact if it ever works against, or is inimical to, anyone's legitimate station and calling, then it is very definitely false devotion.

The bee collects honey from flowers in such a way as to do the least damage or destruction to them, and he leaves them whole, undamaged and fresh, just as he found them. True devotion does still better. Not only does it not injure any sort of calling or occupation, it even embellishes and enhances it.

Moreover, just as every sort of gem, cast in honey, becomes brighter and more sparkling, each according to its color, so each person becomes more acceptable and fitting in his own vocation when he sets his vocation in the context of devotion. Through devotion your family cares become more peaceful, mutual love between husband and wife becomes more sincere, the service we owe to the prince becomes more faithful, and our work, no matter what it is, becomes more pleasant and agreeable.

It is therefore an error and even a heresy to wish to exclude the exercise of devotion from military divisions, from the artisans' shops, from the courts of princes, from family households. I acknowledge, my dear Philothea, that the type of devotion which is purely contemplative, monastic and religious can certainly not be exercised in these sorts of stations and occupations, but besides this threefold type of devotion, there are many others fit for perfecting those who live in a secular state.

Therefore, in whatever situations we happen to be, we can and we must aspire to the life of perfection.

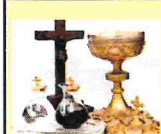

World day for Consecrated Life

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord on Feb. 2nd, also known as Candlemas, has been celebrated since 1997, when St. Pope John Paul II instituted a day of prayer for women and men in Consecrated Life.

The Feast of the Presentation (Candlemas Day) is the day on which candles are blessed symbolizing Christ who is the light of the world. So too, those in Consecrated Life are called to reflect the light of Jesus Christ to all peoples. The celebration of World Day for Consecrated Life is transferred to Sunday, Feb. 1st this year, in order to highlight the gift of consecrated persons for the whole Church.

When we first think of those in Consecrated Life we think of the sisters and brothers that may have taught us in school, or the great saints of the church that wore habits and gave their whole life in service of others. Though this is a good place to start, let us not have our minds stop there, according to Vita Consecrata, written by St. Pope John Paul II, there are seven forms of Consecrated Life. Here is a brief explanation of the different ways Consecrated Life is lived out in and also apart from this world*:

Monastic Life of the East and the West - one of the more ancient forms, living for God alone, by those that follow Christ into the desert, praying and doing works of penance for the love of God and the salvation of the world. Example would be St. Benedict.

Diocesan Hermits - are those called to live apart from the world, in fasting and prayer, and in solitude, with the assistance of the diocesan Bishop in discerning their vocation and in professing the vows of poverty, chastity and obedience.

Contemplative Institutes - are those, like the Carmelites which are completely dedicated to contemplative prayer and to seeking the face of God in silence, by listening to the word of God, participating in divine worship, personal asceticism, prayer, mortification, and the communion of fraternal love. Example would be St. Therese of Lisieux.

Secular Institutes - are those that have publicly professed vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, and who live in some manner of communal life. They do not wear habits or use the title of sister or brother. They share in a common mission while keeping regular employment. The Schoenstatt Apostolic would fall under this title as an example.

Apostolic Religious Life (more often referred to as sisters or brothers) - the most commonly known form in the United States. They are the ones that wear habits and live in communities while caring out many different apostolates in the Church (teaching, caring for the sick and dying, and preaching). Examples of this would include Franciscans, Dominicans, etc.

Consecrated Virgins Living in the World - this vocation is lived in the world (i.e. in their own house, holding a job, providing for their needs, etc.). They have been consecrated by the Bishop through a special Rite of Consecration. Those in this order do not profess the vows of the evangelical councils but have given their whole self (including the gift of their virginity) over to Christ the Bridegroom to live in service to the diocesan Bishop, in prayer, penance and in apostolic roles of serving the Church. They do not use the title of sister and do not take a habit. It is a life lived both active and contemplative, to be the light of Christ in the local Church.

Each of these forms of Consecrated Life are lived out differently and radiate as a witness of the life to come - true union with God.

Please pray for all those who have made commitments in the consecrated life. May they continue to be inspired by Jesus Christ and respond generously to God's gift of their vocation. May more respond to the call of being for Christ and His Church in this life and the next!

On February 1st those living a Consecrated Life within our archdiocese will gather together for a time of prayer. In our archdiocese we are blessed with many forms of consecrated life being represented:

- 35 Communities/Provinces of Women Sisters or Nuns - 320 sisters/nuns
- The Order of Consecrated Virgins - 14 consecrated virgins
- 18 Communities of Men Religious (Priests and Brothers) and 7 communities of brothers - 47 Religious Brothers and 56 Religious Priests
- 2 Secular Institutes (women) - 3 Members
- 2 Societies of Apostolic Life - 7 (Clerical) Members of Societies of Apostolic Life

Totaling 447 Consecrated Men and Women residing in the Archdiocese!

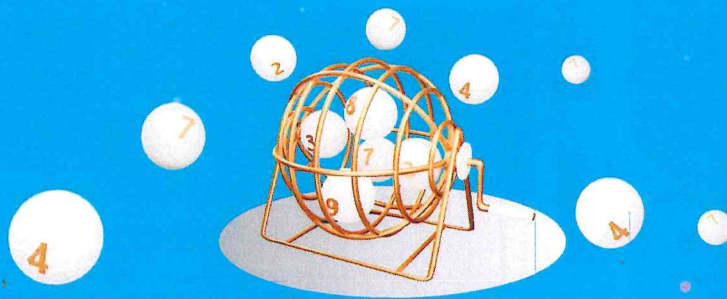
